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Grade 4/5 Celebrates Women's History Month! The Honorable Fatoumatta Njai



Did you know this week the Honorable Fatoumatta Njai visited our class, Grade 4/5. She shared with us her life story and how she overcame challenges of being a woman in the parliament. This essay will shed some light on Honorable Fatoumatta Njai's life.

First, Miss Njai was shy as a child and always ran away from trouble. She went to Saint Joseph primary school and Gambia university. As a child her role model was her grandmother because she was able to connect to the neighbourhood. Her favorite hobby as a child was to go to the library with friends. Though her family was associated with politics. She was never expected to become a member of parliament.

Moreover, Mrs. Fatoumatta Njai was inspired to become a member of parliament by her friend. Her friend encouraged her to run for a spot in parliament which meant that she would have to leave her job as a head of bank to run and when she was in the running she left her party because they were going in the wrong direction so when she tried to help get them back on path they rejected her so she decided to be an independent candidate and ended up winning the election!

Mrs. Fatoumatta Njai ran to be a member of parliament without a political party. She was elected in 2017. She started as the person who shared the petrol coupons. Mrs. Fatoumatta Njai has been working as a MP for eight years.

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High School Visits National Environment Agency



Our visit to the National Environment Agency (NEA) was very productive and informative. We gained valuable insight into their initiatives, the challenges they face, and the steps they take to achieve their goals.

One of the key takeaways was their efforts in waste management. While they have started programs such as the "Set Setal" clean-up, which was originally scheduled monthly, they have faced issues due to limited participation and government support. However, despite the challenges, the NEA continues to push forward. They are focused on raising awareness, supervising the environment, and enforcing rules through fining and confiscations.

A significant part of their work is the regulation of plastic use. The ban on single-use plastics is a huge step in reducing waste, though exceptions are made for important products that require plastic packaging.

During our visit, we had the opportunity to ask questions about the government's role in environmental protection and the measures being taken to address environmental concerns. The NEA provided insightful responses, helping us better understand the puzzling aspects of environmental management in The Gambia.

For the future, we hope to see improvements in waste management and the implementation of more efficient and environmentally friendly systems to help protect the environment.

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Grade 2 Field Trip to Lamin Lodge: Exploring the River Gambia!

Grade 2 students recently had an exciting and educational field trip to Lamin Lodge, where they had the opportunity to explore the River Gambia and deepen their understanding of this vital river and its significance to the community. In Social Studies, we've been learning about the River Gambia: where it starts, its importance to the economy, and its role in sustaining local communities. In Science: we've been learning about ecosystems, and sustainability. This trip allowed the students to experience first-hand many of the concepts they've been learning in class.

The River Gambia, which flows from Guinea through Senegal and into The Gambia before reaching the Atlantic Ocean, is crucial to the people who live along its banks. It plays a key role in transportation, agriculture, and fishing, providing not just water for daily life but also economic opportunities for the communities. Students learned that the river is home to a diverse ecosystem, including mangroves, oysters, crabs, and many species of birds, all of which are important for both the environment and the local economy.

During the field trip, the students went on a boat ride along the river and saw many fascinating things. One of the first things they encountered were the unique mangrove trees, which grow with their roots extending above the water, unlike most plants. The children learned that these trees help prevent flooding by soaking up excess water and provide protection against strong waves and storms. Mangroves also play a critical role in reducing the effects of climate change by absorbing carbon dioxide. Students were amazed to see oysters clinging to the roots of the mangroves, and they learned that oysters are essential for keeping the river water clean by filtering out dirt and pollution.

A particularly exciting part of the trip was the opportunity to witness how local women collect oysters. The women travel by boat to the mangrove areas, where they gather oysters from the roots of the mangroves. They then bring them back, smoke them to make cracking easier, and carefully crack the shells to retrieve the oysters. Students learned that the shells are so sharp that the women must wear gloves to handle them safely. The oyster shells are also repurposed for other uses, such as feeding chickens for extra calcium and even making local cement and paint, and nothing goes to waste.

The students also visited Daranka Island, a beautiful and serene spot where they saw one of the oldest (over 800 years old) and largest trees in The Gambia called a silk cotton tree. This tree was so large that all 16 of the students were able to fit inside its natural treehouse! It was a wonderful moment for the students to appreciate the size and grandeur of the tree,

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and they learned that the community there uses the river in various ways for their daily lives, from fishing to farming and even building.

As the boat continued along the river back to the lodge, the students observed a variety of wildlife, including herons, vultures, and different species of crabs. They learned about three types of crabs in particular: black crabs, filter mud crabs, and land crabs. Students discovered that mud crabs are not safe to eat, as they have a tendency to accumulate harmful substances in their bodies from the mud in which they live.

Another highlight of the trip was the visit to an oyster farm created by the local community. This innovative farm brought by a tourist, made from bamboo sticks and strings, was designed to make oyster collection safer and more sustainable. By allowing the oysters to grow on the strings, the farm makes the process of harvesting oysters easier and reduces the risks of injury from the sharp oyster shells.

This field trip was a perfect way for the students to apply their knowledge from both Gambian Studies and Science units, particularly about plants, animals, sustainability, community, and ecosystems. They were able to connect the concepts they've been learning about in class to the real world, seeing how the River Gambia impacts both the environment and the local people. It helped solidify our understanding of the River Gambia and its importance in both Gambian studies and science.

As Antoine said, "The river sounded peaceful," Indigo added, "The river was calming," and Sadie described it as "the best field trip ever!" We are grateful to the community for sharing their knowledge and experiences with us, making this an unforgettable learning experience.
